

ALL ORDEAL MEMBERS - TAKE NOTICE:

Once you have completed 10 months as an ordeal member of the Order, you may be eligible to seal your membership by accepting the Brotherhood membership. It is expected that all sincere Ordeal members will do so. If you have continued, since the Ordeal, to be active in Scouting and in the Order, then you are your own judge of your readiness for this second step. It involves two parts: a test of your knowledge of the Order, and a formal ceremony of induction.

For the test, you will report to either Hinds or Bornazeen on a certain evening during the summer, and be tested on the facts in the "Brotherhood Questionnaire" and "Song of the Order", both printed below. For those of you who pass the test, the ceremony follows and then you are ready to go home by II:00 P.M. the same evening.

Our goal is for every Ordeal member to become a full member by accepting Brotherhood membership. Do your part!

Be prepared to answer any or all of these questions before you take upon yourself the Brotherhood membership.

What are the four parts of the Ordeal, and their

purposes?

A night of camping alone under the heavens, to prove my self reliance; A day of arduous toil to indicate my willingness to serve others; Twenty-four hours of scant food to demonstrate my power of self denial; A like period of silence to turn my thoughts inward.

By whom were you first stopped as you approached the circle?

By Nutiket, the guard, who asked if I had passed the Ordeal without flinching.

Who next barred your further progress?

Meteu, who inquired if I had been given the Admonition.

Before whom did you last arrive?

Allowat Sakima, the chief of the fire, who asked if I had been completely prepared to receive the Obligation.

What do the two sets of taps mean?

1, 2, 3, - the three parts of the Scout Promise; 1. 12. - the twelve parts of the Scout Law.

How were you and your companions bound together?

By a rope, which, until we took the Obligations, represented our tie to the Brotherhood.

Repeat the Obligation.

I do hereby promise on my honor as a Scout that I will always and faithfully observe and preserve the traditions of the Order of the Arrow, Wimachtendienk, Wingolauchsik, Witahemui, Which I have now received. I will always regard the ties of Brotherhood in the Order of the Arrow as lasting, and will seek to preserve a cheerful spirit even in the midst of irksome tasks and weighty responsibilities, and will endeavor, so far as in my power lies, to be unselfish in service and devotion to the welfare of others.

What is the symbol of our Order?

The arrow, whose undeviating course when aimed high is a token of leadership.

What is the Admonition?

To love one another.

What is the meaning of the W.W.W. in English?

Brotherhood of Cheerful Service.

Know the words of our Official Song.

Firm bound in brotherhood, Gather the clan that cheerful service brings to fellow man; Circle our Council fire Weld tightly every link that binds us in brotherhood, Wemachtendienk.

You must also write a statement of 100-200 words telling in your own words the meaning and importance of the O.A.


ELECTION TRAINING - CAMP PROMOTION

LODGE CAMPOREE TIME

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TO MEET

Lodge Chief John O'Connor has called the March meeting of the Executive Committee for 4 P.M. on Saturday, March 21, immediately following the Election Training and Camp Promotion sessions, at the Calumet Club, Augusta. This meeting is for the four Lodge Officers, the seven chapter chiefs (who used to be District Chiefs), committee chairmen at the Lodge level, and all Lodge and Chapter advisors. We need your attendance and advice if the Lodge is to fulfill its responsibilities.

LODGE ANNUAL MEETING

The 1970 Lodge Annual Meeting, at which we elect the Lodge officers, will be held this year at the Lodge Camporee, on Sunday morning at 10 A.M. According to our Lodge Rules, these officers must be elected in such a way that The Lodge Chief represents the area served by one Council Camp (Hinds or Bomazeen) and the Lodge Vice Chief represents the other camp area. After their election, these two officers become responsible for the summer operation of all Order of the Arrow activities in the two camps, a job which used to be done by the Chapter Chiefs. Please think carefully about your candidates for these two important jobs. Elections will then be neld for Lodge Secretary and Treasurer (two jobs). The Treasurer is responsible for membership records for the entire Lodge, receives dues, issues dues cards, and keeps track of the members' changes in address, status, etc. The Lodge Secretary is responsible for notices and news to all members, ordering and keeping track of all supplies, and all other business not involving the Treasurer. These are all very responsible Jobs - choose your candidates carefully.

Anusigonticook Chapter

At our meeting held the second Sunday of January - because of Snowbird Training the following Sunday - the following business was conducted:

After lengthy debate it was voted that the O.A. Chapter in Rangeley district be named Anusigonticook Chapter, after the Indian tribe that controlled the Androscoggin Valley. They were a branch of the Abnuki. According to the revised by-laws effective November 30, 1969, there is no provision for the naming of the chapters. Consequently, we will be known as Anusigonticook Chapter until such time as the by-laws are amended in regards to naming the Chapters.

Anusigonticook has adopted the dress of the Maine Woodlands Indian for its dance team and ceremonial purposes. It is now the policy of the Chapter to push the adoption of Maine Woodlands Indian Dress for the entire Lodge. The O.A. in this Council not adopting Woodlands dress because of it not being as colorful as the Plains Indian is about as apropos as the Daughters of the American Revolution dressing as 18th century French peasant women because their getup was more colorful. It is an insult to the memory of Madockawanda that we should have named our Lodge after him yet imitate in dance and dress tribes who lived two thousand miles across the plains, for the sake of being more gaudy. If we are going to continue in this ironical course, Anusigonticook proposes that we name our Lodge "Sitting Bull Lodge".

At our meeting the by-law revision was discussed and the specified committee set up. It is planned to request that a special Lodge committee be set up to study changing the dress policy.

The Chapter is planning to have a special fully embroidered, six-color patch made personifying the beauty of the region, and perhaps making them available to all Lodge members.

A letter to the fellow Arrowmen of the Casco Bay Chapter:

Ever since the second meeting of the year, the attendance has dropped considerably. At each meeting there is the same handful of Scouts in attendance. There is an average of maybe six boys at each meeting, excluding the officers. The point at which I'm getting is that to be a successful member of the Order of the Arrow, you must be active. All of these meetings are of great importance. We need people with ideas for our monthly projects. We need committees to go through with our projects. Participation in the Chapter is what counts. Offhand, I would say there are 30% of the Casco Bay members who believe in serving in the O.A. The other 70% just like the idea of wearing a sash with a red arrow on it or other displayable objects pertaining to the Order.

Our past projects have been failures because of lack of participating members. In our Thanksgiving can drive, a proposed 2000 cans turned out to be some 300 odd cans.
