146 join Lodge in year's Ordeals


Nearly 2,000 hours of service—valued at \$10,489.50—were provided Council camps during the three Ordeals held by our Lodge this year.

Spring Ordeals focused on clearing brush left behind in the wake of winter's ice storm. Other tasks included construction of an extension to the front of the Hind's dining hall, painting various camp buildings and the razing of seven old Hinds' latrines.

A total of 146 candidates made their Ordeals during the three weekend events, reports Service Committee Chairman John Ritter. In addition, 63 Arrowmen sealed their membership in the Brotherhood during the Ordeals. Three more made their Brotherhood at the LLD/Fellowship weekend in October.

This represents an increase of 25 Brother-hood conversions over the previous year and a conversion rate of 60%, says Brotherhood Chairman Matt Dubois. A rate of at least 30% is necessary for achieving honor Lodge status.

One hundred fourteen Arrowmen attended the three Ordeals to assist with service projects.

Dubois elected to lead Lodge

Niman, Gagnon and Stearns join him as officers for 1999

In highly competitive but affable elections for the Lodge's top youth positions, members chose officers at the Annual Meeting that reflect a balance among the chapters and a new generation of Arrowmen in leadership.

The Annual Meeting was held Sunday morning, Nov. 1, at the end of the LLD/
Fellowship Weekend at the Bog Brook Training Facility in Gilead.

The officer elections attracted so much interest from multiple candidates that members

had to cast votes in three run-off ballots just to give one candidate a majority.

In the election for Lodge chief, Matt
Dubois of Auburn was elected to succeed Paul
Hallee, who is stepping down after completing
two terms as chief. Matt has been past Abnaki
Chapter chief, and is Brotherhood chairman and
co-chair of the Web Site Committee.

In a four-way race for vice chief, Secretary Joe Niman of York Chapter was elected. Joe is the only current officer returning in 1999. A Vigil member, Joe has served as Ordealmaster several times and is a member of his chapter's ceremony team.

LLD offers activity-packed weekend

Eighty Arrowmen shared learning, challenges and fellowship in an activity-packed Lodge Leadership Development weekend held Oct. 30-Nov. 1 at Bog Brook Training Facility in Gilead. It drew the largest attendance at an LLD in years.

Despite a rainy, blustery start Friday, all Brothers but seven stayed snug in barracks and the educational center of the National Guard base situated just miles from the New Hampshire border.

For the seven, who were making their Vigil Friday night, it was a raw one in the woods of the White Mountain National Forest. Honorces were Paul Conley (chosen in 1997), Judy Andrews, George Dawbin Jr., Andy Frazier, Ira-Michaud, Bill Milasauskis, and Clint Staples (see chart below).

Training sessions Saturday morning included unit election procedures, an update on National policies, and a review of the Service to America Program. Attendees sported their purple souvenir T-shirts bearing the theme "Strong Youth ... Strong Leadership: LLD '98."

Afternoon workshops provided instruction in beadwork, web page design, ceremony symbolism and the role of elangomats/nimats.

Out-of-doors, members could participate in Chapter Challenge volleyball or the military rappelling wall and obstacle course. The latter was headed up by Lodge Staff Adviser Mike Myers.

After a dinner of chicken cordon bleu. mashed potatoes, green beans, salad and Italian bread, it was OA Jeopardy! Three mixed teams responded to clues in such categories as Lodge organization, history of Madockawanda, the Ordeal and People and Place.

An Ice Cream Social, which featured birthday cake for Lodge Vice Chief Andy Frazier as well as the traditional frozen confection, was followed by movies.


Special recognition was given Master Sgt. Daniel Deraspe, the caretaker of the facility for the weekend who served as our National Guard host.






Man with the 'golden' mitts — Cook Wayne Holden, in left photo, pulls a piping hot pan from the oven. Mike Mirasola looks on, below.



The trail leading to the Hinds ceremony site will be named the Bruce Nunan Memorial Trail. Upon recommendation of the Lodge Executive Committee, the Council Camping Committee has approved naming the trail to the OA ceremonial site at Camp Hinds the Bruce Nunan Memorial Trail.

Bruce was a Vigil member of our Lodge who was instrumental in the production of TURTLE SOUP at Hussey Corporation in North Berwick, where he worked.

Okpik offers winter fun

Okpik Maine, the official BSA winter camping program offered through Pine Tree Council, will again use Camp Hinds as base camp for its operations.

Participants in the weekends use the Training Center as a heated lodge upon their arrival and then camp out on Saturday. Activities may include winter hiking, cross country skiing, snowshoeing, winter tracking, equipment making and team building experiences.

Slots still exist for crews of 8-12 persons Jan. 15-17, and Feb. 5-7, 12-14 and 26-28. Registration is \$70 per person. Reservations for your troop can be made through Pine Tree Council's office in Portland.

New logo unifies OA's image

To better position the Order of the Arrow as "Scouting's National Honor Society,"
National OA intends to focus on the symbolism of the arrow as it relates to both the individual and to leadership.

In a related move, there will be a deemphasis of the Order's American Indian image. National has said, however, that it will be retained "in the proper context as one of many 'tools' used to enhance our program."

The newly adopted logo will reflect these changes, focusing on the arrow rather than the Native American. "The arrow is easily the most recognizable symbol that has its origin in our first ceremony," National has said in its policy statement.

So pay your dues now and pick up your membership card at the annual banquet.


OA National chairman will speak at banquet
