Banquet caps successful year

The Lodge capped a very successful year Dec. 6 with an annual Family Banquet that featured Congressman Ed Pease, national chairman of Order of the Arrow, as its speaker. The banquet was held at the Fortune Fountain Restaurant in Farmington.

The Indiana representative was introduced by Chief of the Fire Rees Falkner, Pine Tree Council's scout executive. Pease took a break from his duties on the House Judiciary Committee acting on articles of impeachment to attended the weekend banquet.

Pease spoke about the future of the Order of the Arrow and about time. Time brings change and we in turn must change and adapt to those changes. The passage of time affected us all, he said, and we must live our lives to the fullest while we can or, otherwise, what is the point in living?

Pease was presented with a Lodge trader flap, purple Lodge hat and certificate which will be presented this summer to two scouts awarding them full camperships in Rep. Pease's name (See related story at right).

The banquet was kicked off with Austin Nadeau, a new Brother from Abnaki Chapter, leading attendees in the Obligation. Rev. Gary Ackeley of Strong provided the invocation. Our meal was a delicious Chinese buffet with fried rice and eggrolls and bottomless drinks.

Out-going Lodge Chief Paul Hallee introduced the new Lodge officers for 1999 and his fellow officer on the section level, NE-1A Chief Paul Healey.

Healey invited all to the 1999 Section Conclave and urged their involvement in making this year's event the best OA gathering in New England ever (See related story, Page 6).

The Year in Review—reports from Lodge committee chairpersons—pointed up just what a successful year 1998 has been. One hundred forty six new members were inducted into our Order and 63 Arrowmen sealed their Brothernood during the year's three Ordeals. Three attended the National Leadership Seminar and a record number of Brothers were attracted to the Lodge Leadership Development weekend at Bog Brook the end of October.

The announcement of the LEC-approved camperships was made by Lodge Adviser Carl Gagnon at the banquet.





Failure to pay your dues will result in your membership becoming expired. You will then be ineligible to wear the Lodge flap and to participate in Lodge events.

To be reinstated you are assessed an additional \$3.00. If you haven't yet paid your dues, your membership is expired and this fee must be paid along with the annual dues.

If you have been an Ordeal member for more than three years, your dues are equal to the current Brotherhood fee, or \$20 (Section V, subsection 8, Lodge Rules of Operation).

So pay your dues now and pick up your membership card from your chapter adviser.
