Lodge sets its sights high

Executive Committee affirmed seven goals recommended to it by its officers, and approved an agenda to achieve them.

The seven were developed with an emphasis on creating goals which could be measured at year's end with tangible evidence of whether or not they were reached. The goals accepted by the LEC were:

- Strive to achieve Honor Lodge recognition.
- Replace the Chapter of the Year with an Honor Chapter award.
- Place emphasis and full support behind producing a "Where to Go Camping Guide."
- Work to improve Lodge unity, communications and chapter relations.
- Continue to increase the Order of the Arrow and Lodge's image at Council camps.
- Conduct a productive and meaningful Ordeal season.
- Review and improve the presentation of the Lodge's waterfront project grant application for resubmission to National.

An Agenda for Service

As a service organization, the LEC fittingly set an agenda for service for 1999. At the Fall Ordeal at Camp Hinds work will begin on the waterfront retaining wall project. Despite not having been selected for a National OA Service Grant, the Lodge remains committed to the completion of this project.

As a 50th Anniversary project in 1994, the Lodge created designs and proposals for rebuilding the Council Rings at both Camp Hinds and Camp Bomazeen. While the Hinds' project was completed back then, work on Camp Bomazeen's Council Ring was put on hold while Council decided exactly what it wanted to do with its Belgrade camp.

Now that that decision has been made, the Lodge is committed to fulfilling its Anniversary project. At the Spring Ordeal at Camp Bomazeen, work will begin on the council ring there in hopes of finishing most of the project this year.

Six from Lodge attend National leadership forums

Youth and adult leaders from Madockawanda Lodge will be well represented at two National Order of the Arrow leadership forums.


Four will be attending the National Leadership Seminar, which will be held the weekend of March 26-28 at Camp Alpine, Alpine, NJ.

The three-day intensive seminar is designed to teach leadership and lodge management techniques to newly elected lodge officers and advisers. This once-in-a-lifetime training is offered in each region of the country.

Attending from the Lodge will be Lodge Secretary Josh Gagnon of Abnaki Chapter, Lodge Treasurer Shawn Stearns of K-Valley Chapter, York Chapter Adviser Wayne Holden and Casco Bay Chapter Adviser Geoff Howitt.

In addition, the Lodge's two top youth officers—Chief Matt Dubois and Vice Chief Joe Niman— will be attending the National Leadership Summit, a four-day program being held July 31-Aug. 4 at Colorado State University to introduce the Order's new strategic plan to key Lodge youth leaders.

Chapter of the Year: out ... Honor Chapter: in!



At the direction of the Lodge Executive Committee, Lodge Vice Chief Joe Niman has been given the responsibility of developing an "Honor Chapter" program to fulfill one of the Lodge's 1999 goals.

The Honor Chapter recognition program will replace the existing Chapter of the Year award presented annually at our banquet. The goal of making the change was adopted after lengthy discussion by the LEC during which all agreed the current system does not adequately recognize all chapters that strive to meet the goals and objectives of the Lodge.

"For some years now the Lodge has given out the Chapter of the Year Award annually to one chapter that received a majority of votes among chapter youth leaders at the fall Lodge Leadership Development weekend," Niman explained. "The specifications for the honor have always been somewhat vague."

Modeling the new chapter recognition program on the National Honor Lodge requirements will go a long way toward correcting these deficiencies, the LEC felt.

It will allow all chapters the opportunity to earn the award by meeting measurable goals and developing quality programs within the chapter.

"The development of a measurable and specific set of goals toward which each chapter can strive will not only allow all chapters to reach Honor Chapter status, but will also assist the Lodge in meeting its own Honor Lodge requirements," said Lodge Chief Matt Dubois.

Chapters, under the criteria being developed by Niman, will be required to keep a log of information on participation in events, time spent improving Council camps, descriptions of work performed at district camporees, chapter meeting attendance and positive membership growth achieved through the unit elections in their districts.

"This opens up the potential for any and all chapters to achieve this status," said Niman, "and will encourage Brothers to work closer with each other for the betterment of the Lodge."


This year we are hosting the Lodge banquet on its new day—the first Saturday of December, Dec. 4.
