Using the format worked out at the Executive meeting, the following slate was chosen: LODGE CHIEF--Dave Trafton. LODGE VICE CHIEF -- Ronnie Cross. LODGE SECRETARY-TREASURER -- Ray Ganthner.

Immediately following, the meeting was adjourned by new Chief Trafton and dispersed with the OA Song.

WHAT TO DO WITH "OLD GOATS" IN THE O.A. Archie Holmes

(Mr. Holmes, the author of the following article, is no stranger to Brunswick Scouts. For the last 33 years "Archie" has been the guiding light to the movement in the Brunswick Area. Here are a few of his thoughts on the O.A.--- Ed.)

Many Long moons ago, a certain one of the Forther Cheyenne Tribes had a custom of abandoning their oldsters, when they were no longer able to bear arms and assume the duties of a fighting man. The "oldsters" were simply left behind when the tribe moved to a new campground where the game was more plentiful. Many were ill and some crippled or blind. They fell easy prey to starvation, exposure and capture by other Tribes.

On one historical occasion, these oldsters were left behind and the Tribe moved out. old men rallied together and took stock of their situation. They had seen this drama enacted many times before, now it was their turn. were ready. With their meager supplies they moved to the high ground of nearby hills to watch and avoid capture. From their vantage point, late in the afternoon of the day of their like. We "Old Goats" are limited in our abandonment, they saw dust arising from the plains to the east, and had little trouble determining the origin to be a tribe of hostile redskins. From Council Fire gossip, they knew the moving of the tribe was hastened by the expected pursuit of this hostile tribe.

hat to do? On their hill-top they were not in the path of the pursuers, and were quite safe, but what of the tribe who knew not how close their pursuers were. Running Bear had a grandson in the tribe, Swift Arrow a sister, and Broken Nose had many relatives in the tribe. They must be warned. (next column)

Who would undertake the task? Spotted Turtle not he-he moved too slowly--Running Bear- No chance -- Broken Nose would try, White Eaglewhat of him who was blind. Swift Arrow had a chance. However, they all started out.

Broken Nose had covered scarce three miles, and that at a slow pace, when he stumbled and fell and died clutching at his heart and gasping. Running Bear who had ceased running because of a strange illness which caused his joints to swell in great pain and his fingers to grow at angles acute to his hand. He walked in great pain, and in the gathering darkness fell over a cliff and died of a broken neck. Spotted Turtle, Swift Arrow, and White Eagle, had by now left the balance of the small band behind, and an hour or so afte: midnight, smelled the tribe's campfires and heard the bark of the half wild Indian dogs in the camp.

Swift Arrow, nearly dead of exhaustion and lea ing a simularly exhausted and blind White Eagle burst into the camp ring where the dogs set up a great howling commotion. Spotted Turtle came in hours later and was greeted in like manner. The oldsters were revived, told their story. The Council was called, plans made, and in an early morning ambush the hostile tribe was crushed. The Council met that night and the Chief decreed no one should ever be abandoned again by the tribe. It was also decided that twenty young, swift brave warriors would forever be the rear guard when the tribe moved.

The Oldsters were honored at Council Fire and reinstated in the tribe.

But what of the "Old Goats" in the O.A. Shall they be abandoned by the side of the trail? This is a Boys Program, and although I am an "Old Goat" of 33 registered years I'd hate to be abandoned. Additionally, I, like Running Bear, am to some extent physically impared and connot join "work parties" at Hinds, cannot travel to off places and meetings and the activities only--we are not limited in our lov and fierce loyalty to O.A. Many of us feel frustrated. I have only a few suggestions: Some of us can contribute money, if such a facility were set up and properly operated for the best interests of O.A. We can all encoura the growth and activities of O.A., Encourage Scouts to work toward the goal of being chosen Occasionally we could write a story for O.A. and send it along to Jim Tierney -- he'll take care of it. "Old Goats" if properly noticed could attend local Elections, Tap-Outs etc., and at least be background for a ceremony. (nort non)

Here, then, is our opportunity to translate our words into action; to take part in a nationwide program as individuals, chapters, and lodges; and to know the thrill and satisfaction that comes from being of cheerful service to our fellowmen.

INDIVIDUAL RECOGNITION

A 50th Anniversary Award, in the form of a special emblem to be worn on the Order of the Arrow sash, will be provided for each Arrow man who fulfills the requirements listed below during 1965 and has his work certified by his Unit leader and approved by his lodge or chapter adviser. These items will be available for purchase by the lodge or local council and may be ordered from the National Supply Service. This award is limited to members under 29 years of age.

To qualify for this emblem, Arrowmen must meet the following requirements:

- Maintain active interest in your own unit and in the Order of the Arrow; be properly registered with your unit and have your Order of the Arrow dues paid.
- 2. Attend at least one long-term camp or superactivity with your unit (six days and nights for Boy Scouts; five days and nights for Explorers).
- 3. Participate in at least one council approved Order of the Arrow service project and give six or more hours of cheerful service.
- Advance one rank in Scouting, i.e., First Class to Star, Star to Life, Life to Eagle, Eagle to one Eagle palm. Explorers participate in the unit's specialty or activity program. Explorers may, if they wish, earn five or more merit badges.
- 5. Recruit, train and follow through to see that one new boy becomes a Cub Scout, Boy Scout, or an Explorer. (This requirement must be certified by the new boy's unit leader.) Individual scorecards will be provided by the National Council. The deadline for reporting and applying for the award is November 1, 1965.
