There is no cover charge for the event. There will be a Lobster/Chicken BBQ with all the fixings and a Trading Post will be open, offering 75<sup>th</sup> memorabilia and snack foods.



## School Night For Scouting

September 17th and 19th are this year's School Night For Scouting registration dates. New youth and adult applications need to be turned in to the appropriate district location on September 19th. District training will be held to help your unit have a successful School Night sign-up. Information can and should be sent to your local newspaper, radio station, and television station for promotion of your recruitment night.

Make sure that you take the time to look over the School Night For Scouting training materials that you will receive at your district training to make sure that you have a great night set up for the parents and the kids. Have as many registered leaders on hand as possible to answer questions and to help register new adults and kids in the program.

Here are some reminders for a successful recruitment night:

1. Work with other Packs and Troops in the same community so everyone recruits new kids and adults.
2. Talk to your local school about an in-class promotion with the boys, a few days before the sign-up night, to build their enthusiasm.
3. Make sure that your local religious affiliation is aware of the nights because many will include this information in their worship service bulletins.
4. Talk with local businesses about placing information on their marquees promoting School Night.
5. Place posters in stores and high traffic areas.
6. Some Grocery stores will place a flyer in shopping bags.
7. Cable access stations will sometimes promote sign-up night.
8. Local phone companies will put info on their monthly bills.
9. Invite a local Boy Scout Troop to help keep the kids entertained while you talk with the parents.
10. Have your treasurer attend your School Night Sign-up so that one check with the correct pro-rated fees can be written to the Pine Tree Council to avoid losing any money.
11. Make a great first impression by being organized.
12. Have a calendar of events for the new scout and their family so they are prepared for the upcoming activities.

13. All applications and appropriate pro-rated fees should be taken to the drop-off location on Thursday, September 19<sup>th</sup> unless other arrangements have been made with the District Executive.
14. Have fun and show new families the excitement of Scouting.
15. Before your new families leave the registration night, make sure they know the time, date, and location of your next scheduled den or pack meeting.
16. Families should have phone numbers of key unit leadership.

School Night application turn-in locations have not been secured as of press time. Drop-off locations will be given to you at your School night orientation. Please make sure that your applications have all the proper signatures and pro-rated fees before delivering them to the proper collection site on September 19.

Casco Bay hosted a "Service to Camp" Camporee, with help from the Hinds Alumni, which resulted in many camp projects being completed. The United Way sponsored two days of caring with work crews at both Nutter and Bomazeen!

Many packs and troops have come forward to help with the "Adopt a Site" program and countless hours have been donated to camp. The Friends of Nutter and Bomazeen Old Timers are also working on projects to help get camp ready for our summer guests! More brush clean-up has been done at Camp Gustin with units visiting on the weekends.

## Big Donation to Council Camps!

A large commercial chipper has been donated to the Pine Tree Council to be used in our logging clean-up efforts! A huge thank-you to John Messer at W.A.Messer Company for helping to secure this donation for the camps. John serves on the Executive Board of PTC as the Vice-President in charge of Programming.

This chipper will help the large piles of brush become wood chips to be used as mulch and ground protection in our camps! Bob Gosselin, Property Superintendent, will be in charge of the chipper and will take names of those adults wanting to help chip!

## Forestry Work Update

As part of a Conservation Plan and continued clean up from the Ice Storm of '98, we have just completed the logging effort at Camp Bomazeen. Bob Gosselin, Property Superintendent, along with Rene Noel, our licensed forester, supervised this work. Rene marked trees for harvesting based on their age, damage, and viability to help manage the forest and make our camp safe for its visitors.

In this plan, logging work was determined to be needed at all of our four camps. Work has been completed at Camp Hinds. Camp Gustin is approximately 60% complete and Camp Nutter has been started. Our goal is to maintain a healthy forest and manage future growth, remove any safety hazards, while still keeping the area viable as a recreational camp.

But, with the logging process comes some damage and clean-up work. Bomazeen will need a massive clean-up effort from lots of volunteers to help get camp ready to open for the summer season. The main area of focus, from this winters logging, was campsites and program areas. We have brush that needs to be cleared and placed into chip piles, some skidder trails that need to be raked out, and once chipped – wood chips to be spread!

All help is appreciated! With all of us working together, the job will be easier! The Order of the Arrow will be doing some brush clean-up during their Spring Ordeal, Adopt a Site units will be asked to help clear their adopted sites and groups using the camp on weekends have already pitched in and started the clean-up process! ## Registration Fee Increase

The Scouting program is doing something that it hasn't done in 14 years. The general registration fee for Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Venturing Scouts, and adult leaders is being increased from \$7 to \$10 effective January 1, 2003.

If your unit re-charter date is after December 1, 2002, you will need to collect \$10 from each registered youth and adult instead of the previously requested \$7. December charter renewals will be affected by the fee increase because their new membership effective date is January 1,

2003. The annual \$20 Charter fee will not increase, and the transfer fee will remain at \$1.

Very few groups, if any, have been able to keep their registration fee the same for this length of time! Scouting has always been a great value and it will continue to be that way for our youth.

As your unit committee plans for the 2002-2003 program year, please remember to include the increased fee in your unit budget. This will help to avoid problems that may arise at re-charter time.
