Message from the Council Commissioner

By the time you read this, our new scouting year will be going full force. I want to thank all of our commissioners for their great efforts in the Council's "Race to Scouting" recruiting efforts. Your continued efforts in recruiting really do make a difference in both the life of Pine Tree Council and, more importantly, in the life of the young people that we serve. We must now all follow through with our units to assure that each of our newly recruited scouts are registered with Pine Tree Council. This is of the highest importance to assure that each youth is able to receive all of the benefits of scouting including all the great programming, advancement and the insurances.

All of our scouting districts are now at some stage of the rechartering efforts or will be shortly. As commissioners, we must remember that rechartering is one of our major rolls and duties in the service to units that we accepted when we became commissioners. I urge you to make the contacts with each unit that you serve to assure that each unit is well prepared for the rechartering process and recharters accurately and on time. Remember that on time rechartering is a major step in becoming a quality unit. Last year, approximately forty per cent of Pine Tree Council Units utilized

Crews. All we ask is that you take part in leadership and youth protection training that we provide. Young women 14-20 have an opportunity to explore in Venturing.

In short, Scouting makes families stronger. How? Consider these findings by the firm Louis Harris & Associates:

At least 90% of parents surveyed said that because of Cub Scouting, they share time with their sons by:

- Working on projects together 95%
- Going places together 91%
- Talking together 90%

Scouting also provides structure to bring parents and boys together for projects and activities. 85% of teenagers in Venturing said they talked with their parents about things they learned in the program.

In the end, the most important part of Scouting projects and activities is not the projects or activities themselves — it is the valuable gift of time spent between a Scout and his or her parents. Thanks for taking the time to spend quality time with your child and the other scouts in the unit you are involved in.
